I. Overview

The Gender Studies Programme (GRS), the first academic programme in gender studies in Hong Kong, was established in 1997. Over the past seven years, with the support of gender scholars and the assistance of various units on campus, it has worked continuously to establish itself as a truly inter-disciplinary programme, and to fulfill its mission of providing students with new perspectives and analytic tools for social and cultural analysis based on gender. The Programme has been able to maintain a lead among tertiary education programmes in Hong Kong in the area of gender studies, and to consolidate CUHK as a nexus of gender and women's studies in China through further collaboration with the Gender Research Centre, and strategic partnerships with distinguished institutions both in China and abroad.

In the year 2003-2004, the three new programmes, namely MA in Women Studies, PhD in Gender Studies, and Graduate Diploma Programme in Women's Studies (held in Beijing) were being run for the second year. In the summer of 2003, like many other programmes, the Graduate Diploma Programme was affected by the SARS outbreak, and its summer courses in 2003 had to be postponed to summer of 2004. With an increasing number of alumni, the CUHK Gender Studies Alumni Association was established in 2004. This organization aims to contribute to the development of an academic community of gender scholars and students, by fostering the network between the Programme and alumni, and involving our alumni in new developments in the discipline of gender studies.

The GRS has enjoyed the support of teaching staff from 21 departments of 6 faculties, namely the faculties of Arts, Business Administration, Education, Medicine, Science, and Social Science. The Programme thanks the Department of Anthropology for its administrative support, the patience of its office staff, and the congeniality of its faculty members. The Programme is especially grateful for the generous support of the departments of the MPhil students' subject disciplines.

II. Administrative Structure and Staff Movement

The Gender Studies Programme is an inter-disciplinary and inter-faculty programme, administratively housed in the Department of Anthropology. The Committee for Gender Studies is the policy-making body for the programme, which is currently made up of representatives from participating departments. The Committee also elects the Graduate Panel and the Undergraduate Minor Subcommittee, which oversee the postgraduate programmes and the undergraduate minor programme respectively. III. Undergraduate Minor Programme

This programme puts under one roof the existing gender-related courses offered by different departments on campus, and allows students to study issues related to gender with a thematic coherence. Students from all departments may minor in gender studies by acquiring at least 15 credits.

The Undergraduate Minor Subcommittee monitors both the quality and quantity of the curriculum. While course design and offering are the decisions of the departments concerned, members of the Subcommittee regularly review the contents of the courses as well as the course evaluations they receive, and make decisions on the inclusion and deletion of courses in the programme. IV. Graduate Diploma Programme in Women's Studies

The programme is offered in collaboration with the University of Michigan and the Chinese Women's College. It is fully funded by the Henry Luce Foundation, and aims to provide systematic training in cutting-edge theory and methodology in women's and gender studies for college teachers and middle level cadres in mainland China, and in the long run help to build women's studies programmes in different Chinese universities. The programme comprises intensive coursework over summer and winter breaks, and students complete 8 courses (20 credits) to graduate.

The programme was held in Beijing between 2002 and 2004, with students coming from different parts of the country. The class of 22 students consisted of a mixed group of full and associate professors, senior researchers, high rank cadres, and young lecturers and graduates who recently completed Master degrees. Student evaluations showed that they highly valued this kind of programme. They particularly appreciated the comprehensive scope of the courses, and the level of freedom of expression in the classroom as an intellectual space. They felt that the knowledge they acquired and the network they established in this programme would be a springboard to further the development of women's studies and promotion of gender equality as they return to their respective institutions. All 22 students completed the requirements by August 2004 and qualified for graduation in December 2004.

V. MA Programme in Women's Studies

The aim of the MA Programme is to teach students the basic theories of women's studies and to equip them with essential analytical tools for understanding gender issues. The curriculum is designed to provide a broad base of understanding for individuals who have little or no prior exposure to women's studies in their undergraduate training. In 2003-04, seven full-time and eight part-time MA students were admitted. The courses offered were as follows:

VI. M.Phil. Programme in Gender Studies

The curriculum uses an interdisciplinary approach to achieve a comprehensive study of gender. MPhil students simultaneously enroll in the Gender Studies Programme and an existing graduate program in a subject discipline of their choice. Called “home departments”, these departments jointly supervise the students’ coursework and thesis research. Students also have the opportunity to get advice for their thesis from an inter-disciplinary group of faculty members (listed on page 7). MPhil students fulfill credit requirements of both the GRS and the subject disciplines, and perform teaching assistant duties for the home departments. With a small student quota, the staff-student relationship in the GRS Program is very close.

The MPhil Programme continues to attract an increasing number of high quality applicants locally, from China, and from abroad. In the year 2003-04 there were 8 MPhil students in the Programme, who come from diverse academic backgrounds. In the past few years, students have concentrated mainly in social science and arts. VII. Ph.D. Programme in Gender Studies

The objective of the PhD programme in Gender Studies is to encourage further integration of teaching and research in Gender Studies in East and Southeast Asian societies at a more advanced level. Students work under a supervisor from a participating department. This is the second year of the programme. In the year 2003-04 there are two second year students and two first year students, who are undertaking original gender research using various disciplinary approaches, including anthropology, communication, cultural studies, and psychology.
