Joint Centre for Advanced Study

Background

In its January 2004 publication: *Hong Kong Higher Education – To Make a Difference – To Move with the Times*, the University Grants Committee (UGC) states that it values a '...deeply collaborative system of higher education where each institution has its own role and purpose, while at the same time being committed to extensive collaboration with other institutions in order that the system can sustain a greater variety of offerings at a high level of quality and with improving efficiency'. In particular, the UGC supports the development of strategic alliances and deep collaboration.

The University of Hong Kong (HKU), The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK), and The Hong Kong University of Science and Technology (HKUST) have agreed to work together to develop greater cooperation and deeper collaboration in pursuit of these goals, with the explicit intention of developing their capability to compete at highest international levels.

Initiative

As a concrete plan to realize the deep collaboration, the three universities will establish a Joint Centre for Advanced Study. The first initiative of the Centre is the joint offering of coursework for research postgraduates by the three collaborating institutions.

Basic Goals

Creating a joint centre for the offering of advanced coursework for research postgraduates in a programme would make more efficient use of academic staff, broader range of courses and freeing up time for other professional pursuits. The enriched programme, with more coursework choices, access to the combined strengths of the academic staff of all three universities, and opportunities for students and staff from all three universities to interact with one another, will be competitive with comparable programmes offered anywhere in the world.

Plan

A *Joint Centre for Advanced Study* will be established with various Programmes for the participating academic disciplines under it, one of which would be joint teaching of postgraduate courses. Other activities could include joint colloquia and workshops, distinguished visiting scholars, and other activities that promote learning and research.

Progress

The collaboration will proceed and deepen in three phases:

Phase III Securing external support and finding a suitable site for a <i>physical Centre</i> to act as permanent home for the Centre, and where such joint courses could be held	Long term goal, desirability and feasibility needs to be established

Course Management

Research postgraduate students would continue to receive their research supervision from their home institution, which would also determine the degree requirements and award the degree, but they would take all or part of their coursework at the Centre.
