Nature of the management tasks undertaken in the position as Head of Family Medicine Discipline (2002-07) and Professor since 2003

The complexity of this role was small group of core staff dealing with heavy teaching load covering wide spectrum as well as pressure on research outputs. Unlike UK and Australia, not all doctors need to undergo mandatory vocational training to become general practitioners (GPs)/family physicians so the academic discipline of Family Medicine/GP is not distinct in medical school. A lot of time was needed to spend on lobbying, advocacy and exploring new initiatives for further development. Education

leadership on undergraduate and postgraduate medical education in Family Medicine/General Practice, community partnership and networking with general practitioners (GPs) is needed to build up a strong network of adjunct teaching staff and potential partners in community based research, leading community based research with Professional and/or Non-Government Organisations, and chairing the Organising Committees of major conferences in Community Based Care.

On clinical services, the academic staff provides services at Family Medicine clinics in different localities with the responsibility to develop more integrated services with other professionals in different settings at the existing Family Medicine training centres and evolve a model of integrated primary health care services linking the public and private.

On research development, mapping out the strategic direction to focus on research would provide new knowledge for family physicians and primary care practitioners to deliver high quality cost effective primary health care and minimize the health care burden on the society.

Interpersonal skills

Interaction with senior members of the University and Faculty of Medicine including the University Secretary, Public Relationship Office, Deans of Faculty of Medicine and Graduate Schools, other clinical and non-clinical departments; senior management of health service providers such as Hospital Chief Executives and directors of Nursing and Allied Health Services, and local network of private family physicians; senior management of pharmaceutical companies; Office Bearers of professional and academic associations/colleges local and overseas, and Non-government Organisations local and overseas,

Resolving the constraints of limited resources

With the constraint of resources including manpower, I was faced with a small team of academic staff (all at junior level of assistant professor) coping with an academic discipline which was requested by Medical Council to strengthen further. To resolve the manpower issue, two veteran GPs were appointed with breadth of experience in professional development of the discipline as half time professional consultants developing the postgraduate programmes so more GPs would acquire the fundamental knowledge and skills in Family Medicine. They then became our potential pool of clinical teachers. By providing services to the Family Medicine clinics of Hospital Authority and supervision of Family Medicine residents, the public clinics also became the potential sites for teaching and research. This has evolved a system of adjunct

appointments with practising GPs in both private and public to be involved in medical education and further development for the disciplines.

- Development of first Master degree of Family Medicine in Hong Kong
- Co-editor of two textbooks in Family Medicine (one in Chinese widely used in mainland China)
- Commissioned by Macao Department to use CUHK Diploma in Family Medicine as postgraduate training programmes for practicing primary care doctors
- Professional development for GPs in Macao and mainland China
- Many residents trained under my supervision now become clinical directors, consultants, associate consultants
- International recognitions by serving as External Examiner for Malaysian Master of Family Medicine (Exit examination for specialist in Family Medicine) and external assessors for advancement of Family Medicine academic by other academic institutions in Asia, Australia, Europe and North America

Clinical services and Primary Care Development

- Participation in senior management of clinical services in primary care.
- In 1999, appointed as Honorary Consultant in Family Medicine of a regional hospital with over 1,000 beds and one of the oldest public General Out-patient Departments in Hong Kong with attendance over 600 patients daily but the design was very primitive mainly for episodic care. The task was to upgrade the Medical centre as recognized training centre for GPs so the patients would receive comprehensive and holistic care. The Head of the department was trained to become specialist in GP and worked along with her to supervise the new residents in GP vocational training. Professional development programme for the older generation of GPs (with no formal training) was initiated to upgrade them the skills required as competent GPs. Some of them pursued further postgraduate study in Family Medicine with awards of Diploma/Master. The Centre is now well equipped for GP training and professional development. The Centre has also obtained research grants to conduct health services research and one resident was awarded research fellowship of Hong Kong College of Family Physicians.
- In 2004, to become the Consultant i/c of another Medical Centre of similar scale and past history. It was originally managed by the Government and only in 2003

it was transferred to Hospital Authority. At the beginning we only had a group of junior residents and they did not have higher qualification (not even intermediate qualification) in GP. The nurses were deployed from different hospital wards and most of them had no experience working in primary care setting. We were short of well qualified GPs as clinical supervisors. We mobilised support from experienced and well qualified GPs in private sector to provide additional support. More experienced residents were given the opportunity to act as deputy to learn the management skills on rotational basis. This evolved a team of experienced specialist residents in clinic management and some later became associate consultants.

The job required the Consultant in charge not only transferring his clinical skills to the juniors but also skills of interpersonal communication, conflict resolution, team work and dealing with public. It also required the skills of management of change. The position required interaction with different disciplines of health professionals of different ranking from senior level such as nursing officer and pharmacist to attendants, and also needed to interact with lay public and also local District Councillors and community leaders.

- The Family Medicine Discipline has been working with Non-government organisation and School of Nursing in providing integrated model in enhancing self-care and self-management of patients. Journal papers and PhD thesis were published reflecting the success of pilot project of integrated model. Clinical trial was conducted using Traditional Chinese Medicine for lower limb pain.
- In early 90s, participated in establishing a Medical centre in a private hospital to be GP training centre and focal point for GP continuous professional development to gain experience in service and academic development in both public and private sectors.
- In 2019, appointed as Co-chair of District Health Centre (DHC) Executive Committee of Kwai Tsing Safe Community and Healthy City Association (KTSCHC), the first DHC commissioned by Hong Kong SAR Government in 2019 according to 2017 Policy Speech to strengthen primary health care and was instrumental in preparing the proposal and planning the development of DHC for KTSCHC as Board Director. The budget of the Project is over HK\$300 million (US\$1=HK\$7.8).

Directorship of Centre for Health Education and Health Promotion (CHEP) since 2000

- First established the Centre as Unit in 1999 then became a Centre in 2000 entirely on self- finance basis. During early years, I need to raise funding for office accommodation as there were no office space available. I have gained a lot of financial and analytical skills as well as strategic management skills in operating the Centre.

The strategic directions of CHEP can be summarized as followings: -Health services re-orientation for disease prevention and health promotion Education and Empowerment of individuals and community for better health Advocacy for health public pubic policies and 'healthy setting' for health improvement

Linking with partners beyond health

Transfer of knowledge and skills in adopting healthy setting approach Health research in child and adolescent health, multi-disciplinary community based care, education development for health promotion

CHEP aims to integrate fundamental medical and health knowledge in education arena, and advocates population health improvement as priority government agenda.

Complexity of the job

The job of Director requires interaction with senior officials locally and overseas at ministerial (e.g., Secretary/Deputy Secretary of Government Departments) and director level at WHO Regional Office. It requires interaction with Chief Executive Officers of Non-Government Organizations for joint venture and professional bodies such as Hong Kong Medical Association, academic Colleges, and service providers. Sometime it involves lobbying of legislators such as Nutritional Labelling, prevention of obesity, Healthy School Policies etc. One would not conduct the job well without interaction with health care consumers and community including patients groups, self-help groups.

The job also involves academic and professional credential as well as skills in human resource and financial management. The job requires high degree of skills in networking and partnership with key stakeholders. The Centre is self-financed basis so the Director needs to secure funding for the sustainable development. Well established strong track record of the academic and professional work is needed to respond to the needs of key stakeholders. The job also requires skills in social marketing.
