In 2011-12, three surveys were conducted, with the first one targeted at the local undergraduate students, the second targeted at the mainland undergraduate students and the third targeted at the international undergraduate students. This report presents the key findings of the surveys.

# **Report on the Profile of First-year Undergraduate Students 2011-12**

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## **Summary of Findings**

 Every year, the Office of Student Affairs (OSA) conducts surveys of the profile of the first-year undergraduate students. In 2011, three surveys were conducted, targeted at the local students, Mainland students and international students. Findings of these surveys are summarised as below, to be followed by a comparison among the three groups of students.

#### Part 1: Local undergraduate students

#### Response Rate

2. Of the 3,078 newly admitted full-time local students, a total of 2,236 responded to this survey, representing a response rate of 72.6%.

#### Personal Particulars

- 3. The majority (49.3%) of the respondents are aged 19, and the male to female ratio is 1 to 1.20. The majority (80.6%) of the respondents were born in Hong Kong, while 15.6% were born in Mainland China.
- 4. 71.0% of the respondents professed no religious belief, while 21.8% are Protestant/Christian and 4.6% are Catholic.

#### **Experience**

5. About 77.4% of the respondents had either part-time or summer working experience, whereas 0.6% had full-time working experience.

## Family Background

- 6. The survey reveals that 22.2% of fathers and 14.7% of mothers have received tertiary education.
- 7. A total of 29.9% of respondents come form families with fathers' monthly income ranged between HK\$10,000 and HK\$19,999, while 35.2% of the respondents' mothers have no income. The majority (25.5%) of respondents come from families with monthly household income between HK\$10,000 and HK\$19,999.
- 8. Of the respondents, 49.0% live in private housing (either purchased or rented), 28.0% reside in public rental housing and 19.6% live in owned housing from Hong Kong Housing Authority or Hong Kong Housing Society.
- 9. Students depend on a mixture of financial support for University education. 89.1% of the respondents have to depend wholly or partially on family contributions to support their university education, 53.2% would also take up summer or part-time jobs, and 43.5% would rely on government grants and loans.

#### **Choice of Major Subjects**

10. The respondents considered various factors when choosing their major subjects. 86.8% of them chose their major programmes based on their own interests, whereas 52.1% of them considered their personal goals. 46.5% and 45.8% of them stated that their choices were made in accordance with their admission examination results and career opportunities/prospects respectively.

#### Preference for Extra-curricular Activities

- 11. The three most preferred extra-curricular activities reported by the respondents are
  - overseas exchange programmes (81.3%)
  - internship training in Hong Kong (74.3%), and
  - academic activities (59.4%)

#### Self-assessment

- 12. With regard to possible difficulties in university life, the three most significant difficulties are:
  - attaining course requirements (36.5%),
  - adapting to the university teaching method (35.0%), and
  - participating actively in extra-curricular activities (27.0%).
- 13. 59.2% of the respondents expressed that they do not need any counselling service. Among those who professed the need for counselling service, the following are the key areas which require assistance: study matters (82.9%), career development (78.0%) and personal growth (47.3%).

#### **Career Preferences**

- 14. The three most common factors for the respondents to choose their future career are:
  - job nature (84.9%),
  - personal abilities (75.5%), and
  - salary and fringe benefits (75.2%).

#### Part 2: Mainland undergraduate students

#### Response Rate

15. There are 290 undergraduate students recruited from Mainland China in the year. All students responded to this survey.

#### Personal Particulars

16. The average age of the respondents is 18, and the top three birthplaces of the respondents are Jiangsu (6.5%), Henan and Beijing (6.2%). The male to female ratio is 1 to 1.20.

#### Family Background

- 17. The majority of the respondents (75.6%) have a small household size of three persons.
- 18. A total of 89.3% of the respondents' fathers and 81.4% of the respondents' mothers have received tertiary education.
- 19. 26.1% of the respondents come from families with a monthly household income below RMB10,000. On the other hand, 11.0% of the respondents reported a monthly household income of more than RMB50,000.

#### Choice of Major Subjects and Expectation

20. Respondents chose their major subjects out of interest (69.4%), personal goals (59.1%) and the potential career opportunities/prospects (50.5%). Some 68.0% of the respondents hope to broaden their global perspectives at university.

#### Self-assessment

- 21. On self-assessment of abilities, 87.6% of the respondents regard that they are weak or very weak in using Cantonese to communicate.
- 22. More than half of the respondents (55.3%) indicated that they need guidance and support from the University on career development and developing leadership and organisational skills, whereas 40.6% of the respondents also look for language training and 37.1% for support in academic adjustment.

#### Plans after Graduation

23. Nearly half of the respondents (43.6%) planned to pursue further studies overseas after graduation from CUHK, while about 21.3% would like to work in Hong Kong.

#### Part 3: International undergraduate students

#### Response Rate

24. There are 130 undergraduate students recruited through the "International Students Admission Scheme" in the year, and 93 students responded to this survey, representing a response rate of 71.5%.

#### Personal Particulars

25. The average age of the respondents is 18, and the top three birthplaces of the respondents are South Korea (35.5%), Mainland China (19.4%) and Macau (12.9%). The male to female ratio is 1 to 1.16.

#### Choice of Major Subjects and Expectation

26. Respondents chose their major subjects based on their interest (81.7%), followed by personal goals (41.9%). The vast majority of the respondents hope to study interested subjects and broaden their global perspectives at university (both 96.8%).

#### Self-assessment

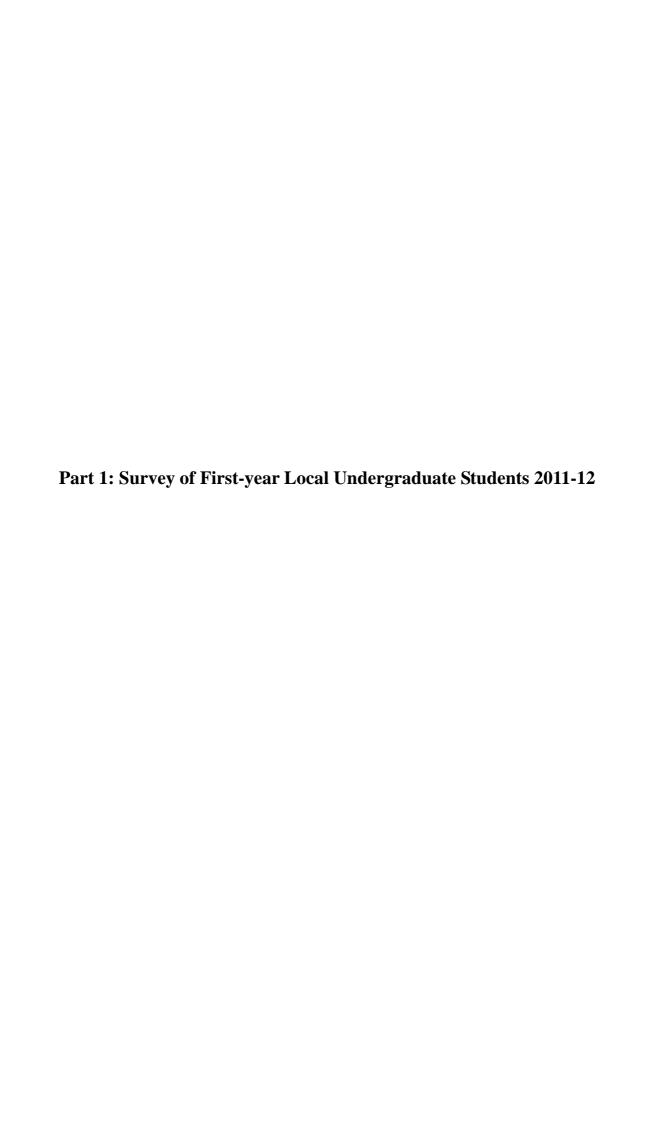
- 27. Students' main anticipated difficulties in university life are as follows:
  - understanding and using Chinese (36.6%),
  - adapting to teaching methods (28.0%), and
  - financial support (23.7%).
- 28. Respondents indicated that they need guidance or support from the University on job/career prospects (80.2%), language training (67.4%), academic adjustment or developing leadership/organisational skill (both 53.5%).

#### Plans after Graduation

- 29. A total of 32.3% of the respondents plan to find jobs in Hong Kong after graduation from CUHK, while 29.0% would like to go overseas to pursue further studies.
- \* All figures in the report are rounded off to one decimal place except those relating to ratio. Besides, there may be a slight discrepancy between the sum of individual items and the total in the graphs and tables of this report owing to rounding off of figures.

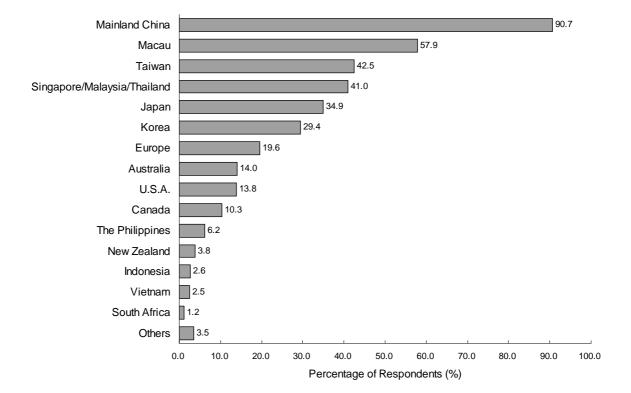


Figure 1: Travel Experience

77.4% of the respondents indicated that they had either part-time or summer work experience prior to entering the University. 0.6% of them had full-time work experience.

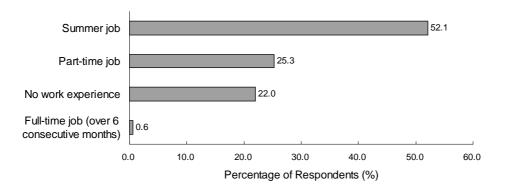


Figure 2: Work Experience Prior to Entering the University

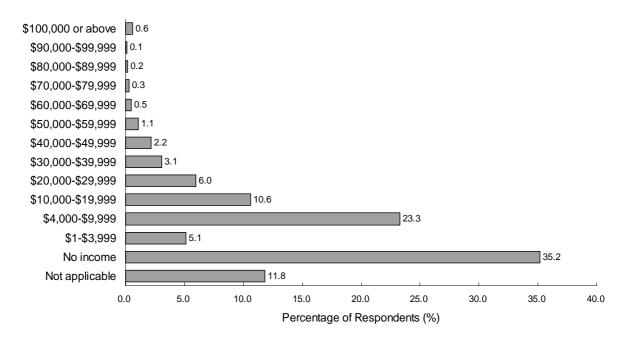


Figure 4: Monthly Income of Mothers

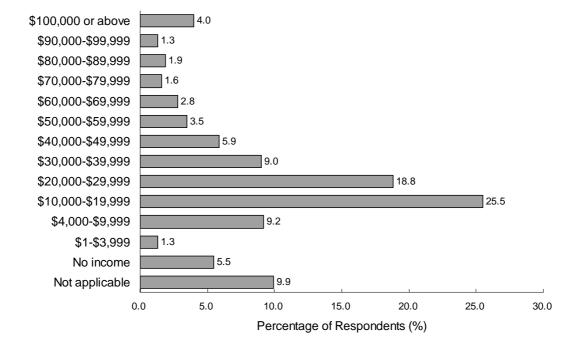


Figure 5: Monthly Income of Household

#### 4.1 District of Residence

#### 4.2 Travelling Time from Home to Campus

The majority of the respondents (67.5%) spend 30 to 89 minutes travelling from home to campus. 3.4% of the respondents have to spend more than two hours travelling from home to campus.

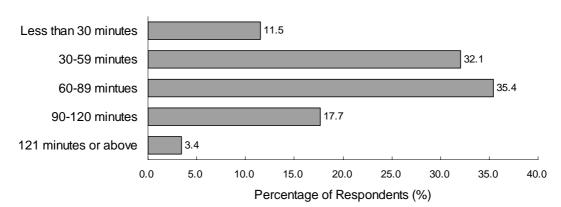


Figure 6: Travelling Time from Home to Campus

41.8% of the respondents live in self-owned private flat/house. 28.0% live in rented flat of the Hong Kong Housing Authority/Hong Kong Housing Society.

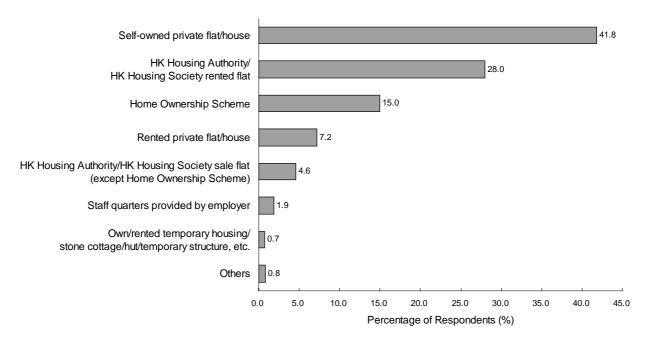


Figure 7: Types of Housing

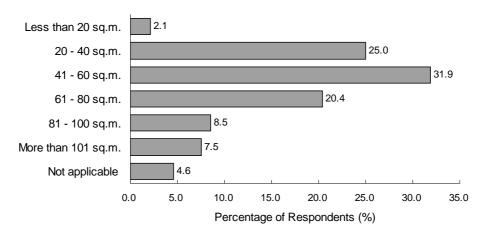


Figure 8: Living Area at Home

## 5.1 Expected Sources of Financial Support for University Education

89.1% of the respondents indicated that they relied wholly or partially on family for financial support, 53.2% indicated that they would take up summer or part-time jobs for supporting university education, and 43.5% expected financial support from government grants and loans.

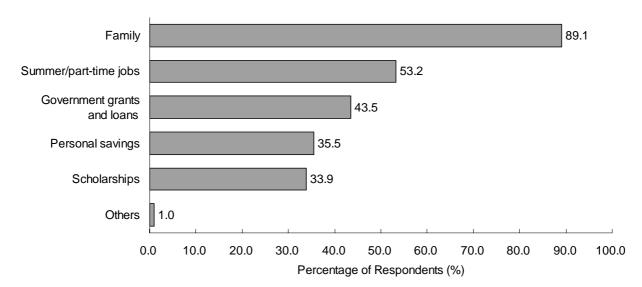


Figure 10: Sources of Financial Support

## 5.2 Factors Affecting Choice of Major Subjects

Among many possible factors for the respondents to choose their major subjects, the top four factors outnumber the rest significantly. 86.8% of the respondents chose their major subjects based on their own interests in the subject. 52.1% of the respondents considered personal goals. 46.5% and 45.8% of the respondents stated that their choices were made based on their admission examination results and career opportunities or prospects respectively.

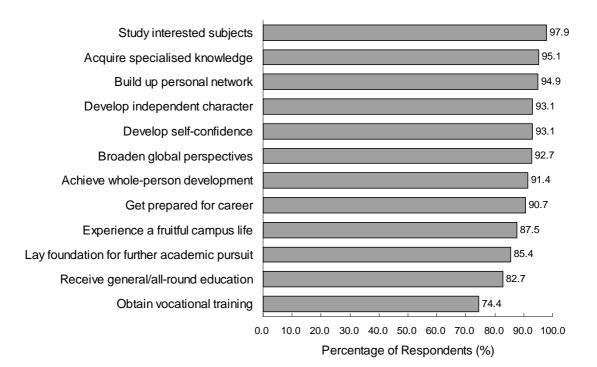


Figure 12: Expectation of University Education

23.9% of the respondents considered they are weak or very weak in computer or software application followed by Putonghua (22.0%). (The detailed figures are shown in Appendix 4)

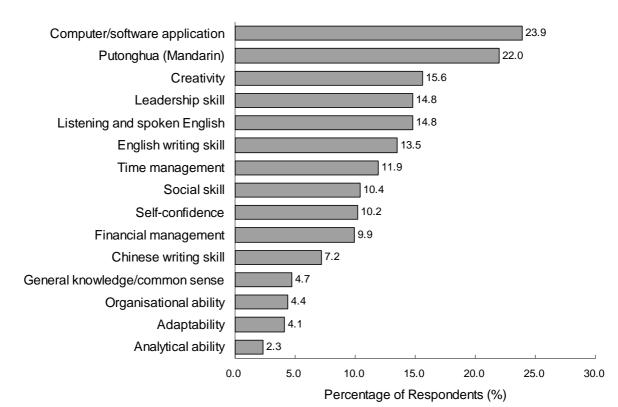


Figure 14: Abilities that Respondents Self-assessed to be Weak/Very Weak

## 5.6 Anticipated Difficulties in University Life and Learning

36.5% of the respondents anticipated that it would be difficult or very difficult to attain course requirements. 35.0% and 27.0% indicated their anticipated difficulties in adapting to university teaching methods and participating actively in extra-curricular activities respectively. 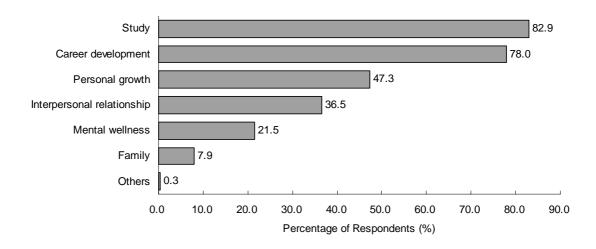


Figure 16: Anticipated Needs for Counselling Service

## 5.8 Reasons for Taking up Part-time Jobs

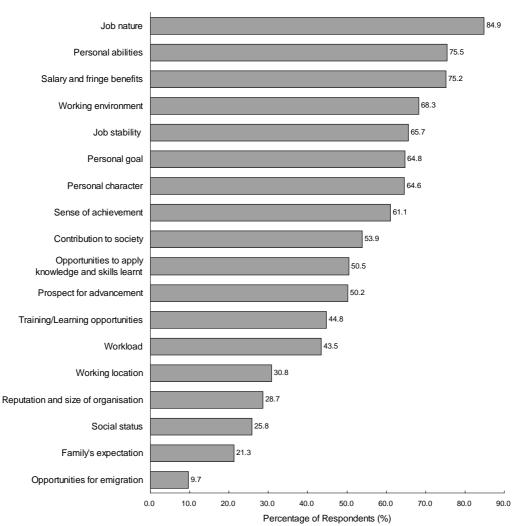


Figure 18: Factors Affecting Choice of Future Career

## 2.2 Age

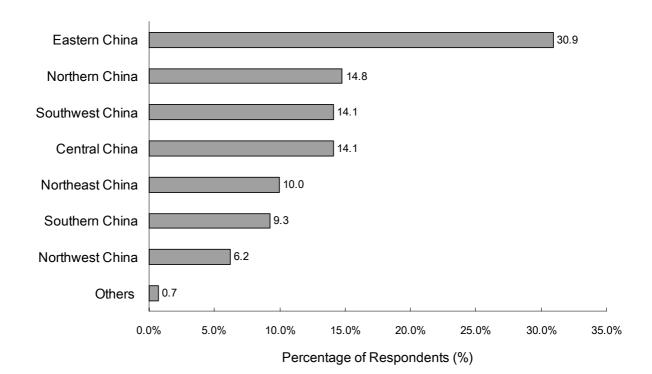
57% of the respondents are aged 18. There are 50 respondents under the age of 18 at the time of survey. Both the male and female averages are 18.

## 2.3 Place of Birth

The respondents were born in 29 provinces and cities of Mainland China. Only one was born overseas.

As shown in the following **Table 3**, the top three ranking of birthplaces of the respondents this year are Jiangsu (6.5%), Henan and Beijing (6.2%). Jiangsu remains the top one for these two years.

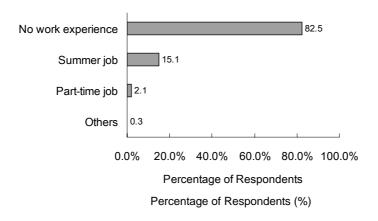

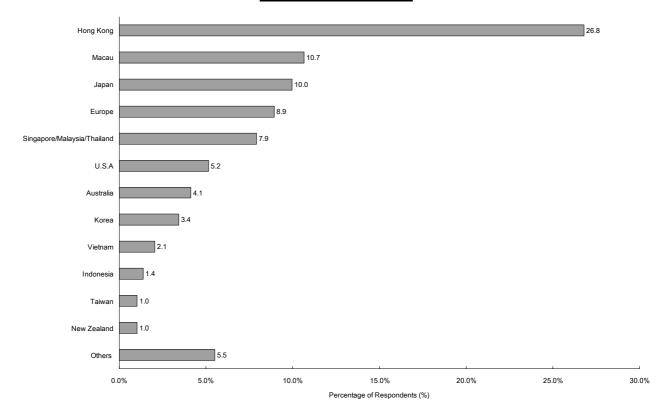


Figure 3:Travel Experience

Figure 4: Fathers' Education Attainment

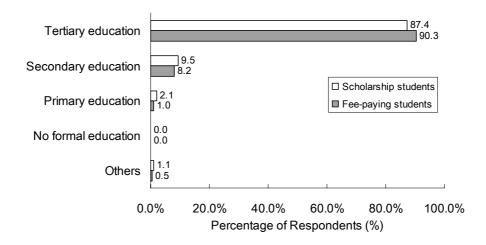
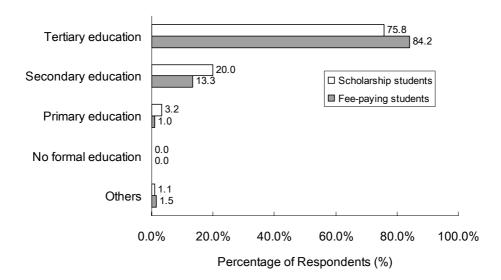


Figure 5: Mothers' Education Attainment

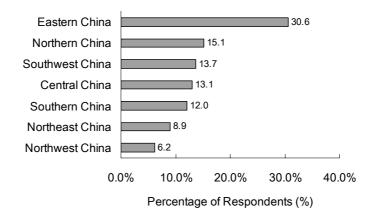

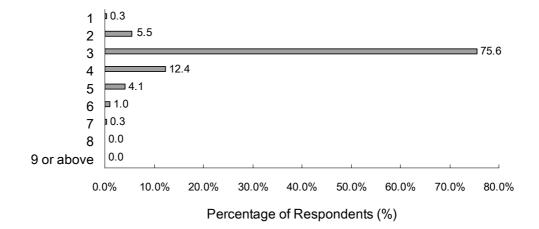

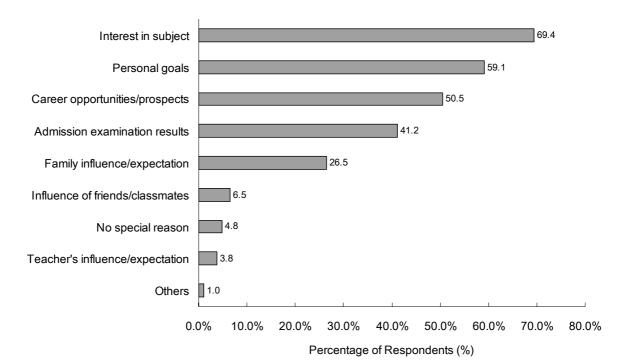


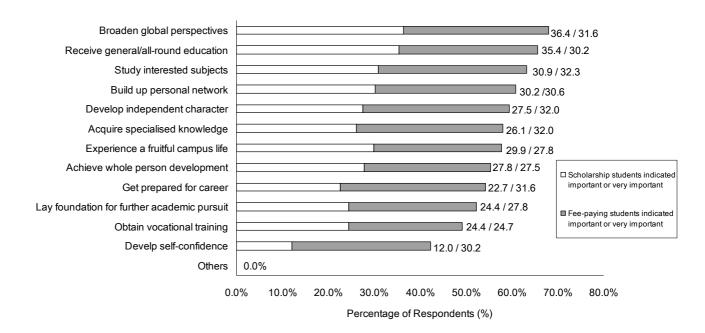
Figure 10: Factors Affecting the Choice of Major Subjects

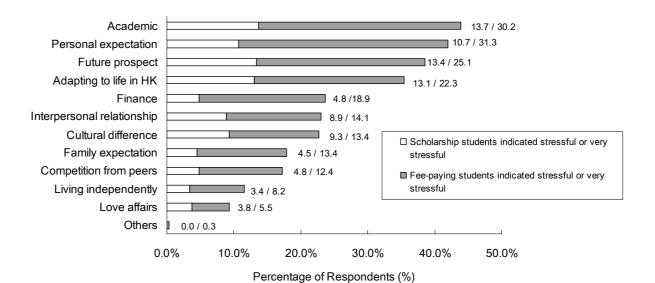


Figure 13: Stress Level of Various Aspects of Campus Life

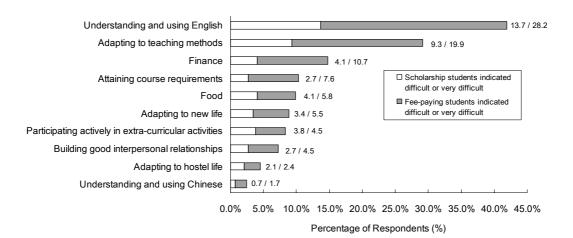


Figure 14: Anticipated Difficulties in University Life and Learning

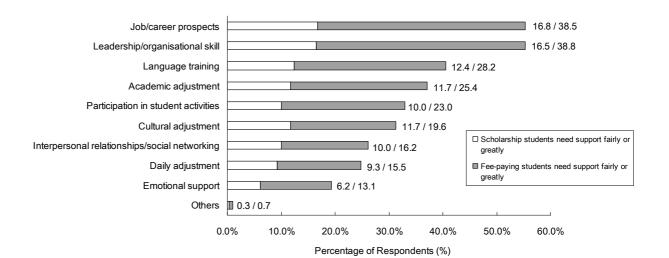


Figure 15: Support to be solicited from the University

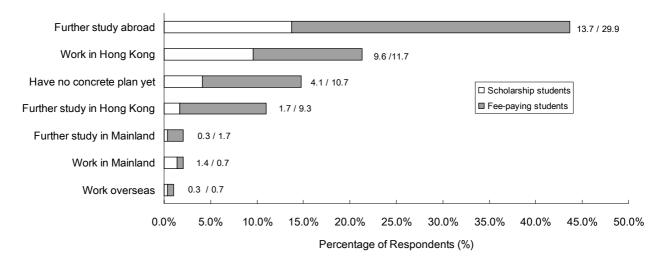


Figure 16: Plans after Graduation from CUHK

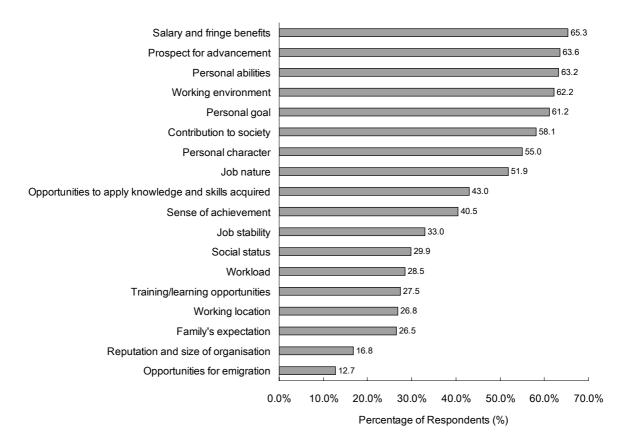


Figure 17: Factors Affecting Choice of Future Career

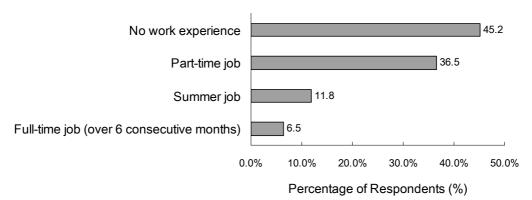

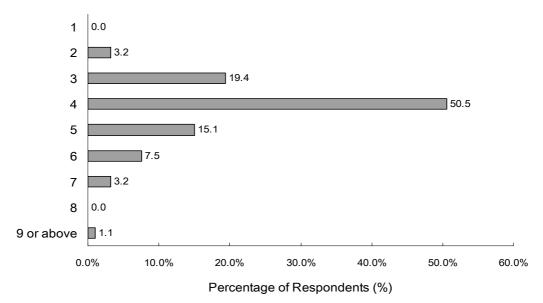

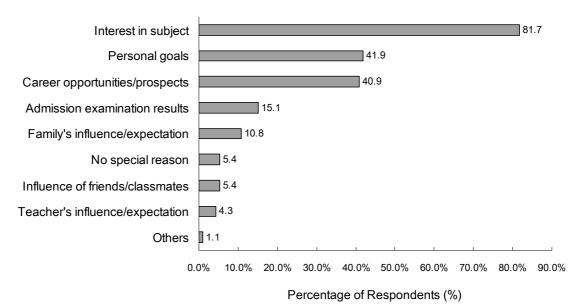


Figure 4: Factors Affecting Choice of Major Subjects

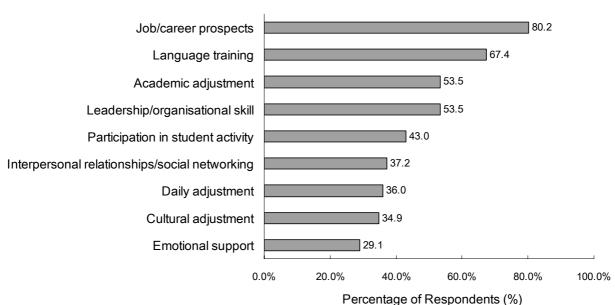


Figure 8: Support Solicited from the University

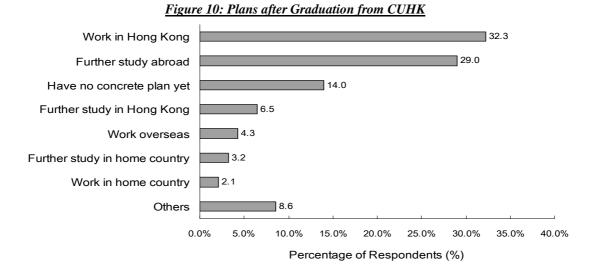
