乾嘉之世,王念孫的《讀書雜志》及王引之的《經義述聞》堪稱為兩本訓詁學巨著。二書共收錄經、史、子、集要籍的文例七千餘條,將漢、晉、唐、宋以來古書晦誤和錯亂的地方加以校釋,王氏父子的卓見和嚴謹的治學方法,對後世治小學者有很大的啟迪作用。

然而,二書之訓詁,乃隨校隨釋,資料散見書中,查檢不便。本人於 1980 年起,即從事《讀書雜志》訓詁資料整理工作,歷數年而成,彙輯為《讀書雜志資料便檢》出版。然《經義述聞》與《讀書雜志》互為表裹,如能將二書訓詁資料合編出版,除便於檢索外,對研究訓詁學,乃至研究王氏父子之學,亦將大為有利。

本計劃擬將二書有關文字訓釋、文字勘誤、假借字、同源字、古今字、異體字及特殊讀音字例,彙輯為篇,並按羅馬拼音、部首及四角號碼編成三種索引,以利讀者檢索。計劃完成後,將出版《讀書雜志、經義述聞資料便檢》,另就研究所得發表單篇論文。

The First Phase of a Computerized Database of the Entire Body of Extant Chinese Encyclopedias (Leishu)

Leishu, namely reference works consisting of extracts from sources extant at the time of compilation, is an important research tool for sinologists for the following reasons:

(1) As the information is classified according to subjects, the compilations in fact serve as indices to works incorporated. In the west, an encyclopedia is a basic research tool. But it is well to remember an encyclopedia in the western tradition, strictly speaking, belongs to a different category from Chinese *leishu*. The Chinese *leishu* is a collection of citations from works extant at the time of compilation, whereas an encyclopedia in the Western tradition, is a new work of an encyclopedic nature.

- (2) Since all the data are arranged in the form of citations, it would thus be useful to re-assemble such quotations.
- (3) The re-constituted works are of great importance for the textual critic. It is well known that most of the extant editions of Chinese traditional texts are marred by corruption and do not represent the original form of the work. As citations appearing in *Leishu* are taken from works which may or may not still exist today, such reconstituted texts would enable us to get closer to the original texts and to solve textual problems.

We will adopt the methodology used in previous projects to build the proposed database. The results of our research, including the database, search engine and findings would be made available through the Internet to the international community of scholars. (AL01268)

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The Acquisition of Academic Literacy by Postgraduate Students from Mainland China

In recent years, Hong Kong universities have begun to attract increasing numbers of research postgraduate students from Mainland China. These students, who have completed all their schooling in their mother tongue in China, are thrust into an environment that requires the intensive use of English. challenges faced by these non-native speakers of English can therefore be daunting. Nevertheless, we have hardly any knowledge of the process through which these students acquire academic literacy in the English language, Research on postgraduate students who are non-native speakers of English has, for the most part, been conducted in the USA. In addition, hardly any longitudinal case studies based on data from multiple sources have been conducted. To our knowledge, no study has been conducted in Hong This project aims to study how research postgraduate students from China acquire academic literacy in Hong Kong. Through in-depth case studies based on data from multiple sources such as the students, their teachers, supervisors, lectures, seminars, and texts, the project will examine how the students adapt to and function within the academic environments in their chosen disciplines and academic institutions. Cultural Identity Formation in Postcolonial Hong Kong

This project involved a sociocultural investigation of an elective intercultural communications course at a tertiary institution in Hong Kong. By means of a survey, background information was gathered from the students (primarily English majors) about such aspects as their previous intercultural encounters.

As a course requirement, the students also wrote a cultural identity paper in which they reflected on their cultural background (sense of belonging to particular groups) and how it might influence their communication with others. Their narratives were subjected to a content analysis, which identified common themes and metaphors that emerged in the discourse. In addition, focus group discussions and interviews were carried out with a sampling of students to further explore their views on this topic. The transcripts of these encounters were then analyzed and linked to the ideas conveyed in their cultural identity papers and survey. The ultimate aim of the project was to better understand the factors impacting on the formation of the students' cultural identities and attitudes towards English and Western cultures. The findings provided a deeper understanding of the complicated mix of cultural, psychological and social factors that were affecting the students' sense of self and their attitudes towards "others." On a practical level, the study provided valuable input for the design and delivery of intercultural communications programs in Hong Kong.

Crossing Cultures: English Majors as Ethnographers at Home and Abroad

Beginning in 2001-2, approximately fifteen second-year English majors at CUHK will join a special stream of studies. In this new program, the students will participate in seminars in Literature and Applied Linguistics, conduct ethnographic fieldwork in the U.K., and prepare a research report. This study will focus on the cross-cultural experiences and adjustment of the subjects. Specifically, it will investigate how they may serve as participant observers in their own culture learning experience abroad. Prior to departure, in the Applied Linguistics seminar, the subjects will be trained to record and reflect on their experiences as culture/ language learners during their five-week visit to the Oxford English Centre in the U.K. In addition to a culture learning journal, the subjects will keep a record of critical incidents - stressful or confusing experiences in this unfamiliar sociocultural setting. The subjects will also be interviewed prior to their departure, at regular intervals during their stay in Oxford, and after their return to CUHK. Thus, this ethnographic study will have a strong element of triangulation and promote an emic (insider's) Data will consist of participant perspective. observation (in Hong Kong and in the U.K.), interviews, surveys (pre- and post-departure), journals, and critical incident reports. An applied goal of this project is to determine ways to enhance the experience of Chinese students in programs of this nature. Critical incidents and cases will also be developed based on the actual experiences of the These narratives will be used in sojourners. pre-departure sessions/intercultural communications courses as a tool for understanding cross-cultural transitions. Every year, between June and October, an average of five to six tropical cyclones threatens Hong Kong. The establishment of the Hong Kong Observatory in 1883, based on political and economic considerations, represented not only the consolidation of the military and commercial situation of the city, but also symbolized the cultural intermediary between East

and West. The role of Hong Kong Observatory has evolved from reporting time, producing bad weather warnings to preparing guidelines for Government planning and further development of Hong Kong since the late 20th century. The research project aims at giving a full account of the evolution of the service provided by the Hong Kong Observatory and its relationships with the development of Hong Kong in the context of human, social, economic, environmental, scientific and technological perspectives.

A Study of the Urban and Port Development in Hong Kong (1843-2002)

The overall strategies and prescriptive possibilities of urban development have proved to be problematical and certainly subservient to the geographic, economic and political constraints. The scarcity of land, the rapid growth of population and the uncertainty of the political future before 1997 were constant sources of urban planning obstacles in Hong Kong. earliest urban development was piecemeal and was largely drawn up to meet immediate requirements. It was not until the post-war period that the contemporary urban form of Hong Kong began to take shape. The development of the early city grew along the two sides of the Victoria Harbour – notably with the construction of habour infrastructure facilities and reclamation of land in new Kowloon and northern Hong Kong Island. Land formation became the foundation of early stages of industrialization in the 1960's. Since the 1970's, the changing spatial pattern and increasing emphases on the New Territories have initiated the expansion of urban area. New land formation policies have been introduced to make Hong Kong a center that is able to provide man power, establish international co-ordination linkages, and modern infrastructure resources for further development. The proposed research seeks to study these elements and highlight upon the evolutionary process of urbanization of Hong Kong.

Deregulation in the Japanese Economy: The Case of the Oil Industry

In response to a series of crises since the burst of the bubble economy, Japan has attempted to deregulate its economy so as to revitalize the fragile financial and corporate system and to overcome costly overproduction capacity with a weak domestic demand. This study aims; (1) to review the characteristics of Japan's regulation of the oil industry; (2) to outline the deregulation process; (3) to assess the impact of the deregulation on the oil industry; and (4) to analyse the impact of deregulation on business-government relations.

This is part of a series of study on government-business relations in Japan by this investigator. The study of the government's regulation in the 1960s and 1970s have already been carried out and published by the author. This is an expansion of this research and focuses on new development since the mid-1980s.

The significance of this study lies in the fact that deregulation is deemed to be a critical step forward for the revitalization of this second largest economy in the world. Its outcome can profoundly affect the well-beings of not only Japan but also many other economies including Hong Kong. The study of the oil industry can provide a critical angle to examine this issue because the Japanese government has extensively regulated this sector throughout the post war era as oil is a strategic commodity for industrial growth and economic well-beings and is mostly imported from politically fragile Middle East. 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Death in Hong Kong: Studies of Cemeteries and Burial Grounds in Hong Kong

Burial grounds and cemeteries play the role of concrete manifestation of cultural values of a given The location of cemeteries and burial grounds, the forms of monuments raised on the graves, the way in which the dead being segregated, all these are keys to interpret the cultural values and attitudes of the society towards death. In the case of Hong Kong, this eminent fact has hitherto been neglected in the academic arena. Through an in depth investigation on the burial grounds and cemeteries of Hong Kong, our project aims to reconstruct the process of cultural change the society underwent as well as to apprehend its cultural hybridity in a concrete and tangible way. Through a systematic investigation on maps and historical maps of Hong Kong, combined with relevant documentary research, we will locate the places cemeteries and burial grounds occupied in the city during the course of its development. Were they marginal, central or subjected to removal, their location in relation to the urban space will be analyzed in detail. Eventual segregation by difference in religions, regional or social origins of the dead will be pointed out and interpreted in terms of political, social, religious and cultural factors.

Adaptations and Translation of Western Drama: A Social-Cultural Study of Hong Kong Repertory Company's Twenty Five Years Practice

Adaptations of western drama has been a long standing theatrical practice on the Hong Kong stage by leading theatre companies, such as Hong Kong Repertory Theatre, Hong Kong Academy of Performing Arts, Chung Ying Theatre and others. The number of translated plays, mostly from English and European languages, put on the stage each year compares favorably and at one time overwhelmingly with that of local original plays. The first and foremost professional theatre company in Hong Kong, the Hong Kong Repertory Theatre, best demonstrates this theatrical phenomenon. In the past twenty four years, it has produced 91 plays in translation, as compared with 56 in original plays, from Thornton Wilder's *Skin of Our Teech* in its inception year, 1977 to the coming *Uncle Vanya* in 2001.

This project is a joint venture with the Hong Kong Repertory Theatre to mark its coming 25th anniversary in the year 2002 to look at productions of its translated plays over the past twenty five years with a view to the following objectives:

- To make an inventory of all these productions as cultural products and provide them with a historical account of the background, the development and the outcome.
- (2) To interpret and study the selection and the audience reception of these productions.
- (3) To investigate their relevance to Hong Kong with reference to social, political, and aesthetic implications.
- (4) To study the Impact of translated plays on the construction, invigoration and self-reflection of local cultural identity, through the forging of contemporary Hong Kong theatre.
- (5) To study the artistic and technical values of the introduction of western plays by the Hong Kong Repertory Company and its example-setting impact on the local theatre in the past twenty five years.
- (6) To argue for these productions or adaptations as intercultural theatre, with great potential for open dialogue between cultures- Hong Kong and Western- in the context of globalism and localism, reflecting the aim by the government of making Hong Kong "Asia's world city".
- (7) To compile a DVD format databank of the research results, which includes DVD collection of 91 productions for future research and theatre education.
- (8) To anthologize theatre history and criticism of translated plays in Hong Kong for future research and theatre studies.

Development of Hong Kong Sign Language by Deaf Children

The research project examines the development of Hong Kong Sign Language (HKSL) by deaf children. It consists of two tasks:

- (1) to document the acquisition of HKSL through the establishment of a corpus generated through a 3-year longitudinal study on 2 deaf children, and
- (2) to investigate verb learning in HKSL.

This project is significant in a number of respects. First, it is the first project in HK that attempts to study the acquisition of sign language by deaf children. Second, cross-linguistic data from HKSL acquisition allows verification of linguistic theory which has so far been examined with the support of spoken language data. Third, it establishes a crucial database for future sign language research in the territory, which in turn sheds light on research in deaf education.

An Interdisciplinary Approach to Cyberculture Research in Hong Kong

As Heidegger pointed out, physics is indeed poeisis in the highest sense. Cultural theorization on modern technology (including of course information technology and the Internet), therefore, should be taken seriously, especially when Hong Kong is now aspiring to become a "knowledge society" in the near future. It should be readily recognized, that any attempt at catching-on with digital technology, be it commercially driven or educationally oriented, should root itself firmly within the arena of its cultural imaginary and creative potentiality.

This research project responds rigorously to the obvious lack of attention given to the cultural part of the emergence of cyberontology, and proposes to face it head-on through an interdisciplinary approach to a

study of cyberculture in Hong Kong. It is a pioneer effort to systematically collect relevant data, to render translated texts for school students, to linguistically analyze cyberdiscourse, to collate an English-Chinese Dictionary of cyber-related hybrid words, and to critically research on how best cyberculture as a whole can be introduced and promoted in primary and secondary schools as well as in universities through a careful design of curricula. Finally, it is suggested that an international conference be organized to consolidate and further develop the findings from the various projects proposed herein. (AL01267)

Syntactic Categories in Early Bilingual Development (Category B - Pilot Projects)

The project investigates the acquisition of syntactic categories by Cantonese-English bilingual children using data collected in the Hong Kong bilingual child languages corpus (Yip et al. 2001). The project includes the following objectives: (1) chart the developmental pattern of syntactic categories in the bilingual subjects' two languages over time; (2) verify the accuracy of tagging of the part of speech in the subjects' Cantonese and English in the existing data and (3) account for the analysis of syntactic categories in child Cantonese and child English in bilingual development vis-a-viz analysis of the adult languages as well as their monolingual counterparts in first language acquisition.

Where the categories differ between English and Cantonese, the possibility of cross-linguistic As an illustration of such influence arises. cross-linguistic influence, one of the topics will be the transfer effects of Cantonese coverbs such as 跟 adult English. It is hypothesized that the use of coverbs as verbs in English in a bilingual child as in He followed me to go is a case of transfer from Cantonese to English, reflecting the interaction between two developing grammars. Evidence of transfer and interdependence of two grammars contributes to the central debate in the study of early bilingual development (Paradis & Genesee 1996, Döpke 2000).

The study of the development of children's grammatical categories crucially hinges on the analysis of the categories in adult language. The project thus has the potential to contribute the study of grammatical categories in natural languages and their specific instantiations in child language. (AL01582)

Messiaen's Colour-chords: Obscured Origin and Development

In the past decades, the music of Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992) has come to be finally established in the canon of western music and the significance of Messiaen scholarship is witnessed by a growing body of literature. In Technique de mon langage musical (1944) and the prefaces authored by him, Messiaen touched on a special group of colour-chords, of which the turning chords, the chords of transposed inversions, the chords of contracting resonance and the chords of total chromaticism stand out in prominence. Messiaen's posthumous Traite de rythme, de couleur, et d'ornithologie, volumes I-V/1 (1994-7), provides yet another important source of comments on these Notwithstanding the extent to which these chords dominate his sound world, their presence in his music, when not noted by Messiaen, remains little known, let alone reflected upon. The secondary literature is largely oblivious of these chords and Messiaen scholars are still left with confusion as to what some of these chords stand for. One salient example is Anthony Pople's misreading of the chords of contracting resonance in his 1998 monograpp on Quatuor.

Given Messiaen's inconsistent nomenclature, it is hardly surprising that this confusion lingers on even after the publication of *Traite*, volume V/I. The significance of this study lies in its investigation of important evidences that have hitherto been neglected

by Messiaen scholars, thus brining to light the obscured origin and development of these all-important harmonic fingerprints.

Chinese Character Frequency: Hong Kong, Mainland China & Taiwan - A Trans-regional, Diachronic Survey

The foundation work of the present project was first carried out by the "Human Cognition Program" of the Research Institute for the Humanities, between 1992 and 1998 under the leadership of Professor Ho Hsiu-hwang. In 1998, a series of research reports (altogether 14 in number), including some statistical tables and various trans-regional and diachronic comparison charts, were compiled for private circulation (one set of these charts can now be found in the Chinese University library). In early 2001 when Professor Ho was about to retire, members of the "Humanities Computing and Methodology Programme" proposed to Professor Ho the plan of reprocessing and repackaging of the findings of his original project with up-to-date information technology (such as Perl, PHP, MySQL etc.) so that these valuable findings can be made known to a wider public through the World Wild Web. This proposal gained the permission and full support of Professor Ho.

Frequency surveys of Chinese characters have been carried out in Mainland China and Taiwan for many times, bringing contributions to foundation education in the respective regions. In Hong Kong, however, this kind of research has never been undertaken to any reasonably large scale (excluding vocabulary frequency). The present project stands out therefore as an epoch-making one in this area. Furthermore, in terms of research methodology, the original project suggested comparative concepts the "trans-regionality" and "diachronism", which are extremely innovative and useful in Character Frequency Research. In the process of reprocessing and repackaging old materials, the current PI introduced further methodological concepts such as "frequency disparities" (trans-regional freq. disp.; progressive and retrogressive freg. disp.) and "file entrance rate" etc., the aim of which is to bring the

"trans-regional" and "dischronic" nature of the original project to full expression.

Modernity, Otherness and Cultural Exchange: China and the Formation of the European Mind

This is a pilot study of a larger project which proposes to examine the role played by European intellectuals' image of China in the formation of the Western modern mind from the 17th Century to the early 20th Century. Representative French, German and British thinkers' knowledge and opinions on Chinese philosophy, religion, culture and society will be studied according to the evolution of the modern European mind in the following 3 phases.

- (1) At the dawn of European modernity (17th to early 18th Century) where representative European intellectuals projected an idealized China-image in their quest for a rationalized world-view.
- (2) European modernity at its maturity (mid 18th Century to 19th Century) where the degradation of China-image in the West coincided with the self-assertion of European identity and the rise of Eurocentrism.
- (3) Transition to Post-modernity (first part of 20th Century) where leading European intellectuals were looking with more fresh and subtle eyes towards Chinese culture and tradition in search of alternatives to the modern Western civilization in crisis.

To avoid the methodological pitfalls of transposing illegitimately the theoretical framework of other kind of discourses (e.g. "Orientalism") to our own, the present research will be conducted under the guidance of the phenomenological method understood in the broad sense, i.e., correct reading of relevant texts in their original language with due consideration of their socio-cultural context. This methodological awareness will help to guarantee a comprehensive and exact knowledge of leading European intellectuals' conception of Chinese culture during the covered periods. The final results will

contribute not only to understand concretely the role of China-image in the formation of the European cultural identity, but also to the role of cultural exchange and that of the image of a leading foreign culture in the formation of cultural identity in general. They will hence contribute to laying the foundation of genuine East-West intercultural understanding. (AL01997)

香港道教儀式研究 Daoist Ritual Practice in Hong Kong

本研究計劃屬於《香港道教儀式及歷史研究》一書的第二期研究內容。本人於 2000-2001 年度獲得大學研究撥款委員會資助第一期的「香港喃嘸道教傳統的研究」計劃。第一期計劃著重研究香港正一派喃嘸道士的喪葬儀式及其傳統來源。受益於此研究資助,本人已發表有關香港正一道士的歷史及其齋儀傳統的學術論文共有三篇,全部屬於這方面研究的首次發表成果,其中一篇已為台灣中央研究院近代史研究集刊接納發表刊載 (2002 年第一期),其餘兩篇已經在國際學術會議發表。

作為另一階段的香港道教儀式研究,本研究計劃將有不同的重點,包括:(1)香港全真派的儀式研究(本計劃得到蓬瀛仙館科儀部的協助);(2)除了第一階段喃喃嘸打齋儀式研究,本計劃還包括香港道教的禮斗和打醮儀式研究。

本計劃的研究方法,一方面,是通過田野調查和道士的口述歷史訪問、以及與《道藏》和《藏外道書》的研究結合,另一方面,本計劃將把搜集到的道教科儀書輸入成為電子文獻本,作為對此課題更深入研討的分析基礎。

最後值得一提的是,中國宗教 (道教) 儀式研究的 學術成果,將不止於認識道教本身的傳統,還觸及 中國及香港社會的近代歷史變遷 (從第一期的研 究成果可証明得到)。

Comparative Study of Christian and Confucian Ecological Ethics

In the recent discussion of ecological crisis, Christianity has been considered by some scholars as one the historical roots of the ecological crisis in the West. Similarly, many scholars assume that Confucianism is too anthropocentric to ecologically relevant. However, in fact there are many scholars of both traditions endeavor to derive theories of ecological ethics from their respective traditions. Many of them attempt to reform their own traditions and to make their respective traditions more "environmental friendly". However, not so many attempts have been made to conduct a comparative study of the ecological ethics of the two traditions. This project consists of a comparative study of the Christian and Confucian ecological ethics, with a view to investigate whether they can complement and learn from each other. Through a critical comparative study of the two traditions' understanding of the relationship between humanity and nature, it attempts to investigate the respective weaknesses and strengths of the ecological ethics of Christianity and Confucianism. It aims at showing that both traditions have the potential to provide important conceptual and spiritual resources for the development of environmental ethics and education, especially if they can learn from each other. The research results may thus contribute to the contemporary discussion on environmental ethics, cross-cultural / inter-religious dialogue, and the development of environmental education. (AL01623)

A Study of Chinese Christian Writings from the Seventeenth to the Early Twentieth Century China

The project aims at an intensive study of the writings of nine less known but nevertheless influential and not much studied Chinese Christian intellectuals ranging from the 17th century to the 20th century. While they represented different denominational circles, periods and locality and yet they were confronted with the same issue of identity as both Chinese and Christian after their conversion into the so-called "foreign religion" of the western world. It is the argument of the three investigators that these Chinese Christians from both the Catholic as well as the Protestant traditions have found their own ways of dealing with their dilemmas of having a dual identity by re-appropriating both the Chinese and the

Christian textual resources through their literary construction and textual practice. They basically affirmed both their native cultural-religious texts in which they have been deeply nurtured and the newly acquired Christian texts they were to commit themselves to being new converts to a new religion. They manoeuvered and made "crossings" between "the two texts", integrating the two into one and provided accommodation for the two to hold together. The writings of these Christian intellectuals fashion the platform on which the contemporary Chinese Christian identity is played out.

The project will contribute to the understanding of the process through which the Christian faith from the West is being contextualized and indigenized to become truly Chinese Christianity. It will challenge the position that because of the uniqueness of languages of the two cultures, there is a "fundamental non-compatibility" between Christianity and Chinese thought and therefore Christianity remains a foreign religion. In a way the project will shed light on the broader and wider issue of cross-cultural studies in general and Chinese-Western religious encounters in particular. The range of Chinese Christian writings covered by this project will also facilitate the implementation of comparable perspectives between Catholic and Protestant traditions as well as between 17th - 18th century and 19th - 20th century materials. Publishing, Reading, and Religious Life in the Popular Literature of Late Imperial China

This project will take a group of Ming-Qing popular literature such as the "God-Demon" Novels as the object of study. Taoism in the Ming-Qing was further popularized, and permeated various aspects of the society. The popular novels witnessed this penetrating influence in relation to the Taoist thought, practice, institution, and symbolism. This project will review the religious nature of the literary forms and genres through production, dissemination and cultural use from the ritual perspective. Moreover, this study will explore how these popular literary works exerted an influence on the reader community in the daily life.

The study will begin with an examination of the relationship between Ming-Qing popular literary works and Taoist scriptures. Second, by surveying the printing and publishing of these works, the study will helps us understand the process of the popularization of Taoism in the novels which served to disseminate Taoism, bridged the religious institution and the lay community, and were regarded as the daily religious texts. Third, this study will emphasize the ritual function of these novels in that in addition to disseminating Taoist thought, they also instructed readers in their religious behaviors, were used as the ritual manuals for the Taoist practitioners, and even became parts of the Taoist ritual writings. Finally, the study will demonstrate that the reading and spreading of these novels was not only a literary entertainment, but also a religious behavior because the reading of these works represented a religious piousness, and the spreading of the stories constituted charities.

A Study of the Ming Taoist Novel

I conducted the research project "A Study of the Ming Taoist Novel" in Paris, France, from May 4 to June 17, 2002. During the period when I was there, I met and exchanged ideas with prominent senior French scholars of China, including some Membres de l'Institut. I also met some young French scholars of China, exchanged ideas with them, and discussed the possible future cooperation between us.

I visited and used the four main research libraries of Chinese studies, where I found quite a lot of important rare Chinese books and other useful materials directly related to my research. In addition, I found several important scholarly French books and doctoral dissertations on Taoism related to my project which are not available in Hong Kong. With these works and materials collected, I am able to fulfil my proposed research goal, that is, the research result will constitute the preparation and data for my further study in the area of religion and Chinese literature.

Finally, being invited by the faculty members and research fellows of Paris, I gave a public lecture at the Ecole Française d'Extreme-Orient (EFEO), Paris,

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TranStock - An On-line CE/EC Translation System for Stock Market News

The stock market fluctuates all the time. Investors need to know the most up-dated stock information to make wise investment. Therefore, stock market news is an indispensable tool for global investors. Hong Kong, being a world's financial center, generates hundreds of stock headlines everyday, which need to be translated on-line to satisfy investors in the different part of the world, who gain the information through the web.

To meet the demand of the market, an on-line automatic translation system; called TranStock – is built to translate stock market news from Chinese into English and vice versa. The major feature of this system is its information-centered approach, selectively putting through the messages by translating information-loaded words and expressions in the source text between English and Chinese. A Curricular Investigation of Specialized Translation Courses in Hong Kong Tertiary Institutions

Technical and business translation accounts for by far the biggest proportion of translation work in the world today. In sheer volume and financial worth, technical and business translation far exceeds the translation of literary texts (Kingscott, 1995; Venuti, 1995). In Hong Kong, specialized translation (ST) courses, such as commercial translation, government document translation, science and technology translation, mass media translation, and legal translation, are core courses in all the six translation departments/programmes in Hong Kong tertiary institutions. However, despite their recognized

importance among universities, staff and students and the efforts made on the part of the universities to put out sound courses, students have generally felt under-prepared upon graduation regarding translation in general and specialized translation in particular (Jin, 1997). An investigation of the possible reasons is in order. It is therefore the intent of this study to make a critical examination of the curriculum design and teaching methodology of ST courses. Through an exploration of the essential 'what' and 'how' of ST courses, suggestions will be made on how to improve the course content and teaching methodologies in line with educational curricular theories and thoughts on translation teaching.

The primary modes of data collection will be (1) questionnaire surveys of instructors of ST courses, professional translators who are recent graduates of local translation programmes, employers of translation graduates and users of translation services, (2) follow-up interviews with a selection of them, (3) and on-site classroom observation.

A Psycholinguistic Approach to the Translation Process: An Experiment with English-Chinese Government Translators

This research seeks to understand the translation process of English-Chinese translators from a psycholinguistic perspective. Think-Aloud Protocols are used to collect data about six Chinese Language Officers, HKSAR government English-Chinese translators, through their self-reports of their problem-solving and decision-making 400-word processes while translating two government documents, one from English to Chinese and the other vice versa. Follow-up interviews after the completion of each translation task were also conducted with each translator to further elicit and/or clarify information about her thinking processes while translating the given text.

The present study will be the first research effort to probe mental activities of translators of non-European languages, as research on the translation process has so far focused exclusively on translators of European languages. Therefore the findings of this study should have both theoretical and methodological implications for the increasingly popular psycholinguistic research on the translation process. As this study will certainly help us understand how English-Chinese translators translate and thus how translators learn to translate, it will also have important pedagogical implications for translator education in Hong Kong and elsewhere. Defining Hong Kong Literature - A Pilot Study of the Criteria in the Canonization of Hong Kong Literature

The project aims at studying the various criteria adopted by critics and anthologists in the discussion and anthologizing Hong Kong literature. analyzing these criteria, mainly in the light of western theories of canonization, the project hopes to identify the different strategies and agenda of individual critics and anthologists in their attempts to define Hong Kong literature. Special attention will be given to the several histories of Hong Kong literature that were published before the return of Hong Kong sovereignty to China in 1997, as in many cases, they represent a serious attempt of mainland scholars to incorporate Hong Kong literature into the grand narrative of Mainland literary history, which is often dominated by political considerations. Responses made by "local" scholars and critics to this narration of Hong Kong literature, mainly in the form of Hong Kong literature anthologies, will also be discussed. The study is of crucial importance in the study of Hong Kong literature because it will help to explain how the present notion of Hong Kong literature is constructed. Further, it is hoped that a somewhat "objective" set of criteria can be proposed for future studies. (AL01785)
