Course Description

Gender, love and sexuality are essential in our everyday life. At the same time, love, gender and sexuality are not entirely essential, but socially and culturally constructed. We have been gendered even before we were born. Being bound by various dominant ideologies, we may easily judge others whose gender performance, love relationship and/or sexual expression are different from ours as normal or abnormal, good or bad. In this course, we will examine with a critical distance issues related to gender, love and sexuality, as well as scrutinize the related norms. In the light of critical gender and sexuality theories, this course aims at raising students' consciousness on topics such as sexual identity, gender roles, feminist movements, LGBT movements, sexual violence, migrant workers, and the sex industry. Students are also encouraged to critically and empathetically understand the diversity and fluidity of gender, love and sexuality, and to reflect upon their own selves.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to

- 1. articulate the key issues of gender, love and sexuality informed by the relevant critical theory,
- 2. interrogate the dominant norms of gender, love and sexuality and their implicit assumptions,
- 3. demonstrate an understanding of the sophistication of gender issues contextually and relate these issues to their daily life, and
- 4. critically analyze on specific gender issues with illustration from cultural texts.
