Course Description

With the development of technologies, contemporary filmmaking has become faster and more flexible. This practical course is designed for storytellers who want to translate their ideas into compelling videos. Through pre-production, filming, to post-production, students will learn the visual-audio language, basic skills and techniques of filmmaking, including production by using Adobe Premiere etc. It consists of lectures, readings, screenings and consultations, hands-on visual projects, and mini workshops; it helps students to explore and develop their conceptual and aesthetic styles.

隨著技術的不斷提高,當代電影製作變得更加快捷和靈活。這門課開設給那些想 將自己的主意和想法轉換成完整影像作品的人。通過前期、拍攝,再到後期製 作,學生們可以學習到視聽語言,電影製作的基礎技術和技能,包括攝影、錄 音、照明,和用 Adobe Premiere 等軟體進行剪輯等。本課由講座、閱讀、放映、 討論、實際操作,以及多次小型工作坊組成,最終幫助同學們探索屬於自己的審 美影像風格。

- 1. To understand storytelling in visual productions.
- 2. To extend the students' knowledge of film genres and language.
- 3. To gain or improve the skills associated with video production, including writing, producing, directing, shooting, and editing.
- 4. At the end of the course, students will produce a compelling video work.
- 5. To organize a screening to show their own works at the end of the semester.
- 6. To learn how to spread and distribute video works.

No	Title	Operational Requirement	
1	Self-introduction video	 Film an introduction video about yourself (2min) Consider using whatever visual methods you would like, or are capable of using. Such as: Still imagery Drawings Video Animation This will be shown in class. 	
2	Film idea and pitching	Come up with an idea for a short film, you will only have 2 minutes to present your idea. Practice how to pitch your idea, which you will have to do in class. Write down your idea (no more than 300 words)	
3	Short film script: draft, version 2, and the group script.	Write a short film script (5-10 pages). Limit the number of locations to 5(maximum), and your characters to 4 (maximum) One script from each group will be chosen by the lecturer to be developed and filmed for the final project. It will be regarded as the group script.	
4	Working diary	Step by step, note the whole process of your filmmaking experience. Each filmmaking student will be required to contribute their own thoughts, experiences, and comments during this process. (Group assignment)	
5	Shot List	Write down the shot list with the detailed information based on one scene of a commercial film or an advertisement.	

6	Storyboard	To shoot still images (or animated / drawn images) and create a storyboard for shot selection / composition for your chosen script. Using images to visually demonstrate the shot composition you will use during filming.
7	Proposal Presentation & Role Pitching	Present your chosen script to class, detailing the storyline, characters, film style, storyboard, schedule, budget, difficulties, and solutions, etc. Each individual member will need to present their planning and preparation for their specific role in the production of the short film. <i>(Group assignment)</i> ; Which role would you like to manage for this film? In class, pitch your ideas, arguments, and why you would be best to direct, or produce, etc. You must pitch for 3 roles, 1 preferred to 3 least preferred.
8	Rough Cut	Producer – must submit the 1 st Rough Cut of the film, each filmmaking student must be present. <i>(Group</i> <i>assignment)</i>
9	Final Cut	Producer – must submit the 1 st Rough Cut of the film, each filmmaking student must be present. (Group assignment)
10	Report	No less than 3,000 words in Chinese /5 pages in English. Final Comments on each student filmmaker's experience, and thoughts about the entire process. Comment on your specific roles during the entire process.
