BUDS5011 Basic Sanskrit 基礎梵語

Course description

This course is designed for absolute beginners in Sanskrit and does not require any prior knowledge of the language. It offers a comprehensive introduction to Sanskrit, with a focus on reading and writing in Devanāgarī script, essential vocabulary, and fundamental grammatical structures. The aim is to develop students' basic proficiency in reading and writing Sanskrit, enabling them to engage with simple primary texts and understand key linguistic patterns. In addition to following the standard framework of introductory Sanskrit courses commonly offered at the university level, this course will also explore, together with students, how contemporary AI tools can be applied to support the self-directed learning of Sanskrit. (For this purpose, it would be better for students to have their own computer, or the best a laptop in the classes.)

本課程為梵文初學者設計，無需任何先學條件。課程提供對梵文全面的介紹，專注於天城體的認讀、詞彙、主要語法。課程旨在開發學員對梵文的基本讀寫能力，使他們能使用簡單的梵文原典和了解關鍵的語言結構。另外，相較於所有同類大學傳統的標準基礎梵語課程，本課程將與學員一起探索如何應用人工智能工具進行自學梵文。

Learning outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students are expected to be able to:

- 1) read and comprehend simple Sanskrit passages, building foundational skills in decoding and understanding basic texts;
- 2) develop their understanding of the basic structure and grammar of the Sanskrit language, including syntax, morphology, and pronunciation, facilitating accurate language use.
- 3) gain an introductory understanding of Sanskrit Buddhist literature, fostering appreciation of its historical and cultural significance within the broader Sanskrit corpus.
- 4) be equipped with the knowledge and skills to use AI tools effectively as a resource for their ongoing and self-directed study of Sanskrit, encouraging autonomous learning and technological engagement.
