



The Need for Systematic Bibliographies in Buddhist Sanskrit Philology

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The objective of a bibliography should be to survey a great deposit of literature and to facilitate and foster research into the reader's field of interest. No bibliography would claim to be perfect. A bibliographer knows by experience how easily materials escape the compiler's attention from his ignorance or carelessness. A bibliography is already out-of-date on publication. No matter how complete a bibliography may be, the compiler will have to omit materials discovered or studies published while it is in the press. A bibliography never ends, and is simply a beginning.

A bibliography is nevertheless a useful first aid and an indispensable tool for scholars in the field of studies concerned. The user of a bibliography should always extend the search for further references in the works quoted in the bibliography and also in other bibliographies on particular subjects or topics.

In the past there have appeared a number of bibliographies in Buddhist studies. Needless to say, Buddhist studies are frequently fostered by other general bibliographies, such as those of Oriental studies in general, e.g. *Tōyōgaku Bunken Ruimoku* (1934-)¹; those in specified scholarly circles, e.g. *Books and Articles on Oriental Subjects published in Japan* (1954-)²; those of specified fields in specified circles, such as Indian studies in Russia: *Bibliografija Indii* (1965)³, or in the Dutch-speaking countries: *Tentoonstelling Sanskritkunde in de Nederlanden en in Europa in historisch perspectief* by A. Scharpé (1966)⁴; those of other disciplines, such as of

religious studies, e.g. *International Bibliography of the History of Religions* (1952-)⁵, of linguistics, e.g. *Linguistic Bibliography* (1939-)⁶, of history, e.g. *Annual Bibliography of Indian Archaeology* (1927-)⁷, or of sinology, e.g. *Revue bibliographique de sinologie* (1955-)⁸.

Surveys of trends in particular fields of studies or institutions sometimes give useful bibliographical information for Buddhist studies. A collection of pamphlets has been published to review Soviet Oriental studies since the revolution.⁹ The Canadian National Commission for UNESCO has published a bibliographical directory of scholars working on Asia in Canadian universities.¹⁰ *Indology in The Netherlands* by J. Gonda appeared on the occasion of the 1964 New Delhi Congress of Orientalists.¹¹ Surveys of Buddhist studies by specialists are valuable, e.g. S. Yamaguchi, *Furansu Bukkyōgaku no Gojūnen* (1954)¹², H. Durt, "Les études bouddhiques en Belgique" (1961).¹³ Useful information is also to be found in surveys of linguistics, e.g. Thomas A. Sebeok (ed.), *Current Trends in Linguistics*, Vol. V (1969)¹⁴; in guides to bibliographies,

e.g. *Author Catalogues of Western Sinologists* by D. Leslie and J. Davidson (1966)¹⁵; in guides to institutions, e.g. S.C. Sutton, *A Guide to the India Office Library* (1968)¹⁶; in indexes of periodicals, e.g. *T'oung Pao - Index général* (1953)¹⁷; in a bibliography of theses leading to higher degrees, e.g. K.L. Janert, *Verzeichnis indienkundlicher Hochschulschriften* (1961)¹⁸; or of a scholar's publications, e.g. M.B. Emeneau, "Franklin Edgerton" (1964)¹⁹ is particularly valuable for its bibliography of works by the late professor who has made an outstanding contribution to Buddhist Sanskrit philology.

Buddhist bibliographies with special emphasis on the research in specified countries have often appeared, e.g. H.L. Held, *Deutsche Bibliographie des Buddhismus* (1916).²⁰ The Buddhist Centre of Halle has published a bibliography of works done in East Germany since the World War II.²¹ A bibliographical survey of Japanese research on Buddhism since the Meiji period has been given by A. Hirakawa and E. Cadel.²² A series of critical surveys of Buddhist studies in Japan has been published by H. Nakamura.²³

Bibliographie bouddhique is a systematic and analytic bibliography on Buddhism covering the period of 1928-1958.²⁴ A number of Buddhologists, Indologists, Tibetologists, Mongolists and Sinologists throughout the world have contributed to this enormous enterprise. It awaits a continuation of this kind to bring it up-to-date, for it has lost its editor-in-chief, Marcelle Lalou, who for more than thirty years devoted much time and energy to carry out this project.

A bibliography of articles in Japanese periodicals has been published by the Library of Ryūkoku University in Kyōto: *Bukkyōgaku Kankei Zasshi Ronbun Bunru Mokuroku*.²⁵ A similar one has also appeared in Japan.²⁶ Writings in Western languages published before the appearance of the *Bibliographie bouddhique* are included in S. Hanayama's *Bibliography on Buddhism* (1961).²⁷ A systematic bibliography on Japanese Buddhism was compiled by a group of young scholars.²⁸ C. Regamey has published an annotated bibliography on Buddhist philosophy.²⁹ P. Beauteix has launched a series of bibliographies beginning with *Bibliographie du bouddhisme Zen*.³⁰

Many Buddhist Sanskrit manuscripts lying on the shelves of libraries all over the world are still waiting for critical editors. Catalogues of those collections are indispensable for scholars. One of the first descriptive catalogues of Buddhist Sanskrit manuscript collections is C. Bendall's *Catalogue of Buddhist Sanskrit Manuscripts in the University Library of Cambridge* (1883)³¹, which contains a number of important texts. Among the recent important undertakings is a series of catalogues published under the editorship of W. Voigt: *Verzeichnis der orientalischen Handschriften in Deutschland*.³² K.L. Janert has provided us with useful information in his book *An Annotated Bibliography of the Catalogues of Indian Manuscripts* (1965).³³ V. Raghavan is making an exhaustive index to works and authors of Sanskrit literature. It is entitled the *New Catalogus Catalogorum* (1949-).³⁴, which has modelled after Theodor Aufrecht's *Catalogus Catalogorum* (1891-1903).³⁵

Buddhist Tripitakas in Tibetan and Chinese are of great value for philological studies of Buddhist Sanskrit literature. Tibetan versions which are believed to be literal translations of the original Indic texts are particularly important. Among the catalogues of the Tibetan Tripitakas the so-called "Tohoku" Catalogue is used by many scholars throughout the world.³⁶ Manuscript versions in both Tibetan and Chinese from Tun-huang often offer important readings and

recensions. Catalogues of the Tibetan manuscripts of the Stein collection in the India Office Library of London made by L. de La Vallée Poussin³⁷ and of the Pelliot collection in the Bibliothèque Nationale of Paris made by Marcelle Lalou³⁸ confer benefits not only to Tibetologists but also to Indologists. A union list of the Chinese manuscripts from Tun-huang was compiled and published by the Shang-wu Yin-shu-kuan.³⁹

A great many Buddhist texts and modern translations in various languages have been published. M.B. Emeneau has carefully compiled *A Union List of Printed Indic Texts and Translations in American Libraries* (1935)⁴⁰. This work has been a model of this kind. Volume One of P. Beautrix' *Bibliographie du bouddhisme* is devoted to editions of Buddhist texts together with lists of catalogues, indexes and glossaries.⁴¹ All the Buddhist works extant in Chinese and Japanese are treated in a bibliographical dictionary edited by G. Ono.⁴² A general survey of Buddhist Sanskrit literature is given with detailed bibliographical notes by R. Yamada in his *Bongo Butten no Shobunken* (1959).⁴³ It is not possible to quote all the know bibliographical works of which a scholar has shared in the benefits.

In the field of Buddhist Sanskrit philology one of the prime necessities is to have systematic bibliographies on particular texts or topics, which should provide essential information with accurate references to the manuscripts, editions, translations, studies, and so on. It is rather difficult to know how many Sanskrit manuscripts of a text are now at our disposal, where they are kept, who has published editions, translations and studies. In my article "A Bibliography of the *Mahāvastu-Avadāna*" (1968)⁴⁴ I have tried to present a detailed bibliography of a Buddhist

text called the *Mahāvastu-avadāna*, which is believed to represent one of the oldest in Buddhist Sanskrit literature. The Lotus Sūtra representing Buddhist Sanskrit literature in its earlier stage has spread from India to other parts of Asia, leaving translations in various Asian languages. A number of manuscript versions in Sanskrit are scattered all over the world — Berlin, Calcutta, Cambridge, Helsinki, Katmandu, Kyōto, Lahore, Leningrad, Lhasa, London, Lü-shun, Marburg, Oxford (?), Paris, Srinagar and Tōkyō. A. Yuyama, *A Bibliography of the Sanskrit Texts of the Saddharmapundarīkasūtra* (1970)⁴⁵ is intended to record bibliographical details of the Sanskrit manuscripts, editions, translations and philological studies published to date, together with appendices on the Tibetan, Chinese, Mongolian, Turkic and Hsi-hsia versions.

On this occasion I would propose that, in the future, specialists in various aspects of Buddhist studies provide systematic bibliographies to promote further research into the fields.*
