## **Exhibition**



## **Comments**

Some people commented that my art visualized abstract concepts and make it easier to understand. For instance, Mountain and Dust from the Mountain implies the relativism idea of Zhuangzi. I was impressed that some audiences were excited and wrote long paragraphs of review.

Sadly, it is inevitable that not everyone was able to understand my art. For example, audiences need to have certain science knowledge to understand the concept of Distilled Water and Diluted Water.

I designed two situations in this work.

Dirty water was distilled to obtain clean water in the first situation. Theoretically speaking, If the boiling point of the dirt is higher than that of water, the resulted distilled water would be one hundred percent water without any dirt.

In another situation, a large tank of clean water was contaminated with one drop of dirt. Then, one drop of the contaminated water was transferred to another large tank of clean water. After repeated dilution process, the resulted water still contains very little of amount dirt.

Dirt represents sin.

Distilled water is a metaphor of an extreme evil criminal who tries very hard to repent and atone, could we consider this person as a good and new person?

Diluted water symbolizes a good person who once committed a minor crime, and tries numerous times to atone. Could we forgive this person? Is this person a good person?







Tung Cheuk Yan Cherry Title: Mountain, 2018 Medium: Oil on Panel Size: 4cm x 3.5cm

A dust can be enormous, while mountain can be tiny.






This work express my reluctance towards being labeled. Chinese words can be written in rows and in columns, and I utilized this property to write dichotomy in two directions.
